Lauren said: "To win film of the month feels so Lauren McAllen (18) headed the group of seven surreal. To know that the film you wrote and directed is out there and being appreciated by its audience is beyond rewarding.

"The fact that the cast and crew's hard work merits an award is just so fulfilling and this film wouldn't have been a success if it weren't for them.

"Winning this award inspires me to continue creating short films and to stop underestimating my abilities."

The crew and actors came from Ullapool, Grantown, Inverness and Nairn.

The BFI's film academy runs annually at Eden Court in Inverness. The free intensive film course tutors young people in all aspects of film-making.

Tristan Aitchison, a tutor on the course, said: "Winning a UK-wide award such as this proves that if you have the ideas, talent and passion, it does not matter where you are from.

"You can make films, win awards and have a great shot at the career of your dreams."

The film, made last October, premiered at Eden Court in March and was also showcased at XpoNorth, Scotland's creative industries festival.

The next BFI film academy will run in the October holidays. Applicants must be between 16 and 19 at the start of course, and from the Highlands, Moray, Western Isles, Orkney or Shetland.
