

A FORMER teacher at The Gordon Schools who directed many productions returned to the stage as guest speaker at its annual prize-giving ceremony.

Carol Ford taught drama before leaving to join the ministry. Now retired, she has returned to live in Huntly and is currently locum minister at Strathbogie Drumblade Church.
